OFFICE BUSINESS

Secretary Patricia Shults met with the Board.

Human Services Director

Mr. Bowen introduced Rosie Rumsey, the new Human Resources Director for Franklin County.

Consent Agenda

HUMAN SERVICES

Human Services Director Dave Hopper met with the Board. Present in audience: Jerrod MacPherson and Greg Wendt.

Mental Health

Interest Income

Mr. Hopper said the Franklin County Commissioners asked him to talk to Benton County about the interest income on Human Services funds. Benton County pulled it off the consent agenda and it has been under study. He has not been able to ascertain where the matter stands other than that. Mrs. Corkrum said our treasurer called their treasurer and found out the interest is just going in Benton County's general fund. It is considered residual cash that they invest. Mrs. Corkrum said her point is if it's not going to go back into Human Services, it doesn't seem fair. But it might be moot because it's the law.

Mr. Hopper said we believe the interest needs to come back to our department because of some contractual obligations. He is working with Ryan Verhulp in the Prosecutor's Office about this matter.

Mr. Bowen said he has talked with Dave Sparks of Benton County. Mr. Sparks told him the interest comes into Benton County's general fund. The state auditor audits a lot of the grant programs and that money is used to pay for the state auditor. Mr. Bowen does not know how much money it takes for the state auditor work but the amount of work involved would eat up the lion's share of it. Mrs. Corkrum said it still should go into the Human Services budget and let them pay for the audit. Mr. Hopper said the interest is probably between \$80,000 and \$100,000 per year. He heard it was also paying for some other things. He thinks there are contract clauses and WAC citations that require it to come back to Human Services. Mrs. Corkrum said the funds could maybe be used for mental health in the jail. Mr. Hopper said it could be used for purchasing mental health services for the most part, or administration or other costs.

Involuntary Treatment (ITA) Filing Fees

The Board reviewed a table titled 2005 Out of County ITA Hearings for all the counties in the state showing the filing fees that have been paid this year and defense

panel costs for Benton and Franklin Counties. Mr. Hopper said county clerks began charging Human Services \$200 for ITA cases in July. Franklin County pays just for Franklin County people. Franklin County funds have paid \$2200 and Benton County funds have paid \$14,400, for a total of \$16,600 to date. This is a new cost to the system.

Mr. Hopper said Spokane County is now sending bills out to people for venue changes because there is a filing fee involved when a venue change occurs. There is also a \$20 processing fee. The RSN Executive Committee decided to send a memo that we will not pay Spokane or other areas right now while we study the issue. Mr. Hopper will talk to Jean Wessman from the state office about this matter. He doesn't think the state realized a lot of their money was going to go for filing fees.

We pay the defense panel costs for mental health hearings at \$50 per case plus an hourly rate if it goes to jury trial. We have between two and four jury trials a year.

Mrs. Corkrum asked Mr. Hopper to check into the actual costs.

Chemical Dependency

Methadone

The Division of Alcohol and Substance Abuse (DASA) is having Human Services monitor how many admits there have been due to opiate use and also collect some other numbers. Based on the results, DASA will make an assessment of whether there are enough potential slots to consider having a methadone program here. A company in San Diego will have to decide whether they will activate the entire planning process for a methadone program

Children's Administration

Mr. Hopper said a staff person has been moved to the children's services office in a chemical dependency position. He explained the role of a staff person that has been moved to the children's services office in a consultive liaison linkage role. The staff member is bilingual and bi-cultural. The program has worked very well statewide. That position has been known as the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) outstation worker.

Developmental Disabilities

Waiver Clientele Required Services

The funding would have required the staff to do assessments full-time. All 12 counties refused to accept that condition. We accepted the contract for the rest of the year but not for next year. We did that to send a message that things were not well and that we wanted the original concept. We required DASA to put a request in their budget for new staff.

Developmental Disabilities Advisory Board (DDAB)

One position is open on the DDAB. We're looking for a Franklin County resident. We would like ethnic representation on the board. The chairman is Ed Frost.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Planning Director Jerrod MacPherson and Assistant Director Greg Wendt met with the Board.

Public Hearing: Short Plat SP 2005-14 for applicants Alfred and Nellie Martenson to short plat 2.74 acres into two lots. The lots are 1.21 acres and 1.53 acres in size respectively. The property is zoned Rural Community – One Acre (RC-1).

Public Hearing convened at 9:39 a.m. Present: Commissioners Corkrum and Koch; Planning Director Jerrod MacPherson; Assistant Director Greg Wendt; County Administrator Fred Bowen; and Clerk to the Board Mary Withers. Present in audience: Alfred and Nellie Martenson, Blaine Hulse, Jim Holland and George Banning.

Mr. Wendt reviewed the information on the Action Summary (Exhibit 11).

Mr. MacPherson showed a copy of the aerial photograph with zoning overlays. He reviewed the conditions of approval. The Health District requirements are unique because of the large amount of slope on the site. He noted that this property is in a geologically hazardous area. Any building permits will require geotechnical engineering.

Mrs. Corkrum asked twice if anyone in the audience would like to speak against this proposal. There was no response.

Mrs. Corkrum asked if anyone in the audience would like to speak in favor. Al Martenson spoke in favor. He has hired Mike Black as the environmental engineer and he is working on the project now.

The hearing was closed to audience participation.

Mrs. Corkrum said she is glad to see that the geotechnical engineering was emphasized because of the landslide area.

Motion – Mr. Koch: I move we grant preliminary approval of Short Plat 2005-14 subject to the seven findings of fact and five conditions of approval. This is Resolution 2005-511. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 2:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 12)

Smart Growth Livable Communities

Mr. Wendt and Engineer Tim Fife attended a recent meeting called Smart Growth Livable Communities. Pasco, Kennewick, Richland, West Richland, Franklin County and Benton County are working together. A compact is expected to be prepared. Some language might be prepared that will go into the comprehensive plans for each entity.

PUBLIC WORKS

Engineer Tim Fife met with the Board.

Bid Opening: Motor Grader

Bid Opening convened at 9:52 a.m. Present: Commissioners Corkrum and Koch; County Administrator Fred Bowen; Engineer Tim Fife; and Clerk to the Board Mary Withers. Present in audience: Blaine Hulse of Rowand Machinery Co. and Jim Holland and George Banning of Western States.

Three envelopes were received:

Western States Equipment

Net total bid \$73,346.18

Clyde West send a notification that they are unable to bid the proposal but want to be kept on the list.

Rowand Machine Company (RMC)

Total net bid \$64,980.00

A man in the audience asked Mr. Fife to break it out. Mr. Fife read the individual portions of the bid.

Mr. Fife will review the bids and give the Board a recommendation on Monday.

<u>Annual 2006 Construction and Purchasing Program</u>

Mr. Fife gave the Board the proposed Annual 2006 Construction and Purchasing Program.

Mr. Fife said the program shows purchasing of only two sheriff's vehicles now based on the number of miles on existing vehicles. One Impala only has 80,000 miles on it. This means we may purchase more vehicles in 2007.

Mr. Koch asked if the Impalas were the best buy right now through the state bids. Mr. Fife said Impalas were somewhat of an experiment because they were supposed to get better gas mileage. One problem is the officers don't like driving them compared to the Ford. Another problem is that a number of people don't fit in them because of their size.

Mr. Bowen said since gas is so expensive, maybe he should switch from driving a county pickup to an Impala. He thinks adding another car in 2007 may hurt us more than purchasing it now. It would be more economical to drive the Impala than a pickup.

Mrs. Corkrum and Mr. Koch said that is fine with them. Mr. Bowen asked if the Impala is in good condition. Mr. Fife said yes.

Mr. Fife said the 15-passenger van is for the work crew. The two pickups are for the Planning and Building Department. Mr. Fife said he knows the Board did not give approval for making the Planning vehicles into four-wheel drives. Mr. Koch said he has talked to Planning Director Jerrod MacPherson about the four-wheel drive request since the Board meeting. The Planning Department was considering using Ford Focus or Escape models as four-wheel drives, not large pickups. Mr. Fife said an estimate was prepared to change vehicles from two-wheel drive to four-wheel drive with the difference being about \$6000 total for two vehicles that the Planning Department would be required to pay. The Focus and Escape vehicles are front-wheel drive. The current Planning pickups are rear-wheel drive.

Mr. Bowen said if the pickup he is driving was sent to auction, it would probably bring in more than the Impala. If so, we could take the difference between the pickup and the Impala and put it towards Public Works's four-wheel drive unit and diminish the cost. It might take care of the whole issue and take care of everybody's problems.

Mr. Koch said the Escape-type vehicle can also hold more passengers, which the pickup cannot. Mr. Koch thinks the planner needs to come back with more information.

Mrs. Corkrum said we can approve this program and then amend it later.

Mr. Koch asked about the roadside mowers in the plan. Mr. Fife said the roadside mowers we have are entirely too big for what we do with them. He said we're not going to spend as much as we spent originally on the mowers because we're not going to replace them with like vehicles.

Motion – Mr. Koch: I move that we okay the 2006 Annual Construction Major Equipment Purchases and CAP program. This is Resolution 2005-512. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 2:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 13)

Local Agency Agreement Supplement: CRP 582/Dilling Lane Bridge

The Board has previously approved an agreement but the amount was incorrect. The correct supplement has been prepared. Resolution 2005-513 was assigned.

Motion – Mr. Koch: I move that we rescind the prior local agency agreement supplement for the CRP 582/Dilling Lane Bridge Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 2:0 vote in favor.

Motion – Mr. Koch: I move that we approve Resolution 2005-513 for the CRP 582/ Dilling Lane Bridge. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 2:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 14) Draft DEIS Letter for Coyote Ridge

The Board reviewed a letter Mr. Fife has prepared as a DEIS letter regarding Coyote Ridge prison expansion at Connell.

<u>Motion</u> – Mr. Koch: I move that we authorize this letter to be sent on to Washington State Department of Corrections for the Coyote Ridge Corrections Center expansion impact study. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 2:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 15)

<u>Public Works Trust Fund (PWTF)</u>

Mr. Fife said the PWTF notified him this morning that they found some additional money and it looks like we can probably get our loan if we want it. He said the bad news is I don't know how I'm going to pay for it. Mr. Fife will look at the information and come up with some options. We can always take a lesser amount. We're authorized up to \$4.5 million. If we're going to take the lesser amount, they probably want to know how much that would be so they can give it to somebody else.

Mr. Fife knows what Mr. Brock wants but he was kind of banking on that just keeping us whole with inflation, cost of living adjustments, asphalt prices, gas prices, and everything else that we're going through.

Mrs. Corkrum asked Mr. Fife to have Public Works accountant Dennis Huston do some work on this matter.

Mr. Fife said the levy shift would easily pay the loan payment but he knows that the county is hurting for the Current Expense budget, too.

Mrs. Corkrum said that's something we talked about before. Mr. Fife talked about a problem with the way the figures had been calculated in the past. Mr. Koch said he needs more discussion on this matter. Mr. Fife said the calculation is now being done correctly.

AUDITOR

Public Hearing: Adopt 2006 Budget

Public Hearing convened at 10:15 a.m. Present: Commissioners Corkrum and Koch; County Administrator Fred Bowen; and Clerk to the Board Mary Withers. No one was present in the audience.

Mrs. Corkrum announced we are here for a Public Hearing to adopt the 2006 budget. However, the budget is not ready for adoption. We'll extend our Public Hearing to December 14 at 9:15 a.m. in the Commissioners Office. Hearing was recessed until December 14.

OTHER BUSINESS

Ronnie and Sunny Dick met with the Board. Also present: Engineer Tim Fife.

Road Problem

Mr. Dick explained a problem on the road near the intersection of Sandifur and Road 60 North which turns into Overton Road. The City of Pasco has paved a portion of the road but only one lane. They have put barricades up for safety reasons. A map was reviewed. Mr. Dick also showed the Board photographs. Mr. Fife said he thinks this is where the road changes from county to city. Mr. Dick said the west side of Road 60 north is in the city. He said the city was unable to get right-of-way to the east so they didn't

finish the whole lane. They did fill a hole and took out one barricade in line with Road 60.

Mr. Fife asked what are you asking? Mr. Dick said the city left a hole about a foot deep. They put barricades up. It still leaves one lane for people coming in and out. He is concerned there will be an accident.

Mr. Fife said there are a bunch of issues. This is not the only spot where the city has done this. He said it is against the law for their city limit line to go down the center line of a road. They have done that several times. He has pointed it out to them.

Mr. Dick said he would just want compaction there with gravel at this time.

Mr. Koch said he needs to look at the site. Mrs. Corkrum agreed. The Board will work with the City Council if necessary.

Mr. Dick said the simple solution right now is to use gravel.

Recessed at 10:23 a.m.

Reconvened at 10:30 a.m.

SAFETY COMMITTEE

Chief Civil Deputy Prosecutor Ryan Verhulp, Treasurer Tiffany Coffland, TRAC Manager Troy Woody and Debbie Ford of the Prosecutor's Office met with the Board. KONA Reporter Dennis Shannon was present in the audience for a brief time.

Safety Committee Report

A graph was reviewed showing 2005 incident reports for the county. Mr. Verhulp pointed out that some departments have more incidents just by the nature of their service. He noted that TRAC incidents have significantly been cut back since the beginning of the year. Ms. Ford said these incident reports encompass incidents related to employees and to the public.

Mr. Verhulp gave the Board a list of the Safety Committee accomplishments in 2005 (Exhibit 16). He said the committee is required to meet by law.

The committee is asking the Board to consider a change for next year that would allow departments to appoint alternates who can serve on the committee.

The committee has increased the accessibility of reporting incidents by making forms and policies and procedures available on the public drive. Every employee was sent a notice via email that if you have an incident you are required to report it, here are the forms, and here is what you do.

A workplace safety inspection checklist has been prepared. Almost all of the departments have filled them out and submitted them back to the committee. The checklist has pointed out concerns or risks in their departments. The committee evaluated those and has also evaluated incident reports.

Mr. Verhulp said the committee is appreciative of all the accomplishments it has made. The committee members feel the way the Franklin County Policy is written for the Safety Committee somewhat impairs its ability to take action beyond this level. The committee reviews all the reports. The policy now reads that the committee gives a recommendation to the Board on each incident and what corrective action should be taken. In a practical sense, it does not seem to work. The Safety Committee would like the Board's comment as to any ideas or recommendations you may have.

The Safety Committee intends to make some draft revisions to the policy to provide direct recommendations to supervisors in terms of what type of corrective action maybe could be made. They would like to know if the Board has any recommendations as to what you might see as the Safety Committee's role and/or the Board's role. We will bring the draft policies to you towards the beginning of next year for your consideration.

We're trying to indicate that safety is of importance. It has effects on bottom lines in terms of worker compensation costs, for instance. We have a collective effort, a new approach toward safety, hopefully to benefit the county.

Mr. Verhulp said this is the end of the year report. The committee is asking the Board for any recommendations and any further comment.

Ms. Coffland said with the way the incident reports have been handled, it seems like the process ends as soon as the committee finishes reviewing it. In some cases, it doesn't go back to the department or get discussed in the department. We have some departments that have repeat offenses of things safety-wise that maybe we need to make

them accountable for. There needs to be some education as to how these claims affect employees' paychecks as well as the county's budget. The Board agreed. Mrs. Corkrum gave some examples.

Ms. Coffland said we would like to rewrite the policy and make some recommendations to the supervisors. She asked how would the Board then like to proceed if the supervisor does not take any action?

Mrs. Corkrum asked how you would propose to follow up? Mr. Woody said we need to draft a proposal and give it back to you. At the very least, the system should make it a pain for them not to follow the recommendations. It could state that we all agree there are standard guidelines and if it's a preventable accident then there will be a progress report. If you choose not to do a progress report as a department head, then you have 30 days to respond in writing and send us a report, or something along that line. The way the system is right now, if there is an incident I'll never get questioned and I don't have to do anything about it. There may be legitimate reasons for not taking action. He doesn't think the Safety Committee should ever be able to override a department head. But a department head should have to explain.

Mr. Woody said the other thing we have to figure out is how to do some safety incentives. The incidents have occurred fairly frequently.

Mrs. Corkrum said many incidents are plainly careless. Accidents do happen. She realizes different departments are more susceptible to accidents than other departments.

Mr. Bowen said he thinks what Mr. Woody is saying is absolutely right. The elected officials need to buy into it and be a part of it in order for this to work. How do the commissioners penalize them? By cutting their budget? The incentive is to keep favor to get the requests that are asked. Is there any way that we can do an incentive program? What would it be?

Some ideas were discussed. Ms. Coffland said maybe funds could be added to a budget for capital purchases or training or whatever. Mrs. Corkrum said we could check with other counties to see what they do. Mr. Bowen said everyone should be taking this

very seriously and should not require a carrot. Mrs. Corkrum said because the L&I payments are going up, it is taking money away from being able to provide items for departments.

Mr. Bowen said as a starting point, a memo could be sent out and ask elected officials and department heads for their ideas. Maybe elected officials and department heads are already willing to do this. The memo could request a 30-day return to the Safety Committee.

The Board expressed appreciation that the Safety Committee is an active committee.

Mrs. Corkrum said she thinks the changed policy should have at least a reply back to the committee and a report. Everybody should be informed.

Mr. Bowen said even though we don't have an awards banquet, we still offer awards. Maybe there is some way to have a competition going with different departments that the department would have some type of award, undetermined at this point, to be rewarded after having so many days without an incident. Ms. Coffland said the clerical departments rarely have claims. Mr. Bowen said maybe you have two different awards, maybe categorizing the type of departments. Mrs. Corkrum said maybe a certain amount of the cash carryover amount in a department could go back into their budget the next year to be used for capital improvements. Ms. Coffland said you can show how it benefits the person. The incidents are causing the rates to go up. It will take time for the rates to reduce because we have a three-year rollover period.

Mr. Bowen said the Safety Committee can prepare the proposed changes to the policy and come back with recommendations for the Board. Mrs. Corkrum said Thurston County and Grays Harbor County have good safety committees. Mr. Bowen said the Risk Pool may have the safety policies from many counties.

The goal is to encourage a reduction in the number of incidents.

TRAC

TRAC Manager Troy Woody met with the Board. Present in audience: Ryan Verhulp and Debbie Ford.

Fairs Conference Update

Mr. Woody said the IAFE conference was good and well worth the time. It was considerably more valuable than the one we attended in Yakima. He found good entertainment options and good vendor lists. It was well attended, increased by 8% over last year.

Guest complaint response letter

Mr. Woody and Mr. Bowen are going to meet with a TRAC user about a complaint. Mr. Woody has also responded to another complaint that Mrs. Corkrum asked him about previously.

RV Park November 2005 Financial Statement

The November 2005 Franklin County RV Park financial statement was reviewed.

Every RV space now has a dedicated phone line so the phones can be rented.

Mr. Woody said that has been a significant issue since we increased the occupancy. The demand for phone lines has increased as the building has become busier.

TRAC November 2005 Financial Statement

The November 2005 TRAC financial statement was reviewed. Mr. Woody expects to know as nearly as possible the true balance of the subsidy that will be required within a few days. Bills for the subsidy will be sent to the City of Pasco and the county.

Mr. Bowen asked that TRAC provide a breakdown of utility expenses.

TV Ad

A TV ad is running for TRAC. Mr. Woody gave the Board a computer disk with the program. The ad was produced using funds from the trade-out fee for the tower camera. TRAC has already received two phone calls about the ad.

PROSECUTOR

Chief Civil Deputy Prosecutor Ryan Verhulp and Legal Secretary Debbie Ford met with the Board.

Wilson House

Mr. Verhulp said Ms. Ford did some research regarding the Board's inquiry about whether it would be possible to donate Wilson House to Our Lady of Lourdes. The

answer is a donation cannot occur. A 2005 Attorney General opinion was reviewed. There is no specific authority to allow for donation of the building.

Mr. Koch asked if it could be sold charging perhaps a dollar. Mr. Verhulp said that is more feasible. Mr. Bowen said we've done this with other government agencies.

Mrs. Corkrum said the property was gifted to the county. The deed and the deed of trust have been reviewed. Mr. Verhulp said it's a consideration but even if the deed allows the county to donate it, there is no law that gives you the authority to just donate it. A sale would be different.

Mr. Bowen said if it is not a government agency, the county would have to put that out to bid. He told the Board about the possibility of leasing the property. If it were auctioned, it would have to be done using a closed bid process.

Mrs. Corkrum said this building has been used as a clubhouse for the mentally disabled. There are counselors available to help with bank statements and bank accounts. The deed of trust was with Franklin County to Mid-Columbia Mental Health, which is what it was then. Now it is Benton-Franklin Human Services and they contract with Lourdes Counseling. They're going to put a \$50,000 roof on the building, which is why this has come up.

Mr. Verhulp said the direction we know of is you need to consider avenues other than donation. Mrs. Corkrum asked such as a long-term lease? Mr. Verhulp said sure. Mrs. Corkrum said she thinks a long-term lease would maybe be okay with Lourdes.

There was discussion about the possibility of a long-term lease.

<u>Initiative 901</u>

Mr. Verhulp said because Initiative 901 passed, a smoking prohibition goes into effect on Thursday. The employer's responsibility is to make sure there is notice of the prohibition posted at all entrances to county buildings. The statute language doesn't provide direction as to what should be contained in those notices. There is designation that smoking cannot occur within 25 feet of the entrance. Mr. Koch said the Health District sent out the notices to the county. Mr. Verhulp said those could be used. It's a

matter of providing the notice in some form. We are responsible as a county to see they are posted.

Mr. Bowen said he would suggest putting the signs on standards instead of on the buildings. Mrs. Corkrum said we have to post signs temporarily right now.

PUBLIC WORKS

Engineer Tim Fife met with the Board.

Employee

Mr. Fife said employee Kingsley Berg has taken a position at Chelan County.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

County Administrator Fred Bowen met with the Board.

Green Energy Today (GET)

Engineer Tim Fife and Planning Director Jerrod MacPherson joined the meeting. Mr. Bowen said GET wanted to use some county property as an easement and put a \$1 million facility on it. However, we have to put the property up for sale, then auction the property off, or do a 35-year lease. An aerial photograph with map lines was reviewed.

Mr. MacPherson said there has been discussion about dividing the piece of property into two, leaving one portion of the parcel as the long, narrow piece that has the South Columbia Basin Irrigation District (SCBID) wasteway located on it. The other portion is large enough for one or several homes.

The Board reviewed a map showing GET's proposal for an access road. They reviewed a map showing a proposed separation of the property with the required easements. Public access has to be retained for the shoreline.

Mr. Bowen said if the Board wants to move toward the lease option with GET, there could be three home building sites. Mr. Fife answered Mr. Bowen's questions about the use of the county's gravel pit on the parcel. Mr. Bowen pointed out to the Board the potential to divide the property and then sell three riverfront property lots. A subdivision would be required.

The Public Works Department has an employee who can do the surveying.

The Corps of Engineers would have to be petitioned to release the flow easement.

Mr. Fife said the reason the Corps would release it is that it is no longer needed.

The Board had consensus agreement to begin proceedings to divide the parcel into a short plat. It will be determined if the property is tax title property.

Mr. Fife and Mr. MacPherson left the meeting.

Courthouse Renovation

Potential Change Orders were reviewed.

Potential Change Order 108R: cost to provide carpet material only for room 36 is \$1026. Mr. Bowen obtained a cost of \$1026 to install carpet instead of vinyl in one room in the basement of the Courthouse. Mr. Bowen thinks the cost is excessive. He is inclined to leave the floor vinyl at this point. He asked for Board direction. The Board said to leave the floor as is.

Potential Change Order 114: Cost to fabricate and install glass signage frame and assembly, \$1017. This does not include any staining or finishing cost. This cost is to build frames to frame the old glass signs which would be mounted above the vault doors instead of in the rotunda. The signs were not originally built for the courthouse but have been there for a long time. The Board gave approval.

Potential Change Order 118: Entry and garland specialty painting cost, \$3044. The specialty paint was done due to the gilding. It has already been done. It was verbally approved. The Board gave approval to finish the paperwork.

Potential Change Order 120: This work has also been done. The cost is \$4700. It was done without approval. Mr. Bowen would ask that it be approved. There was a gap at the top of the scagliola. It was filled in. It wasn't part of the original scheduled work. The Board gave approval.

Potential Change Order 122: Plaster ornament repair at alcove 228, \$676. The leafing in the first alcove was repaired. The Board had verbally approved previously. The Board gave approval.

Potential Change Order 123: Historic white tile replacement, \$15,357. Mr. Bowen told the contractor to move forward. The Board gave approval.

Potential Change Order 125R: Cost to install handrail support, \$617. This is for the side handrails at the front door. The third stand mounts into the ceramic tile at the top landing. It was missed by the architects and missed on the plans specifying that the handrail needed to be mounted in the tile. The Board gave approval.

Potential Change Order 126: Window treatment cost, \$3879. Mr. Bowen said this item was missed in the plans. As he understands it, for the shades or curtains that go over the windows, there is a choice to create brackets that go above the windows rather than bolting shades into the old windows. It would occur on all the floors of the courthouse. It will cost about \$3879 to do that. Mrs. Corkrum asked if the shades when closed will obstruct the woodwork of the windows. Mr. Bowen understands they are above the woodwork. Mrs. Corkrum hopes all the woodwork will show. Mr. Bowen will have to look. The Board gave approval.

There is an option to use a pull cord or crank to raise the curtains. The current plans are set for a pull cord. If you want to use a crank instead, it will increase the cost by \$3000. Mr. Koch said he thinks all the crank will do is pull the cord. Mrs. Corkrum said it is but she is concerned about how people handle cords. She thinks they should have been electric. Mr. Koch asked if they will be opened and closed very much. Mr. Bowen does not know. The Board would like to see a sample, perhaps looking at another building that has the crank.





I have reviewed the Transportation Section 3.13 and offer the following comments:

1) Why just a 6-year analysis was used in determining impacts? Twenty-year horizon typically used as useful life.

Why limit growth to 1% per year? With the increase of 568 jobs, Conneil, based upon your projection will see at least a 10% increase in housing. A 10% increase in traffic on local roads is more reasonable.

3) This DEIS needs to address construction traffic.

The existing counts are based upon only two days of observation, Tuesday and Wednesday, August 16 and 17. Why was Tuesday and Wednesday chosen? Why was August chosen?

There is no doubt that this proposal uses up capacity of the intersection of SR395 and Columbia Avenue. With longer waiting times will come accidents. Accidents, in Eastern Washington, determine where and when the next interchange is built, not typically capacity. Accidents will occur when people perceive there to be extraordinary delay time.

The baseline or existing volumes should reflect those times that would have the highest traffic, not Tuesday & Wednesday. Friday would have been a more logical choice.

Also, Franklin County is an agricultural based community. As such, traffic volumes are seasonal. The surrounding agricultural area is primarily dryland wheat. Traffic volumes and turning movements would be at their peak in July. Therefore, July counts would be more realistic.

Is that the position of this DEIS (let accidents happen and fund WSDOT improvements at this intersection based upon safety after they happen with WSDOT funds)?

There was no discussion in regards to interim spot improvements that would improve the safety and extend the life of the intersection before an interchange is needed. Those might be new or enlarged acceleration, de-acceleration lanes, left turn lanes on SR395. Dedicated right turn lanes on Columbia Avenue that separate left turns from right turns.

This proposal will use up the capacity that now exists at the intersection. Will the Department of Corrections be participating in their fair share of the new interchange improvement costs based upon capacity used by this facility? If not, new developments in Connell will be affected once the capacity (accident volume) is reached and be expected to pay the entire cost to mitigate.

Based upon these comments, I believe the additional time or effort needs to be put into the Transportation Section of this DEIS.

Your efforts in this regard will be greatly appreciated.


