WSU EXTENSION OFFICE

Extension Director Kay Hendrickson met with the Board.

Early Literacy Program Update

The early literacy program started March 19. Of the approximately 60 people who applied, 30 were accepted and 28 have attended consistently. As a mandatory requirement, they meet Monday night, Wednesday night, and two Saturdays a month. Tuesday night additional help is available. The Saturday meetings are from 10 to 5 with a mandatory requirement to be there for two hours of class time. Participants can also spend additional time.

The participants are older than we thought they would be. The average age is 44 years, with an age range from 26 to 56. The average length of time that participants have been in the U.S. and particularly here in the Franklin County area is 14.4 years. We have no one that has been here less than five years. A third have been in the U.S. for more than 20 years.

The literacy level is much lower than anticipated, which is shocking and critical to how we proceed in the future. We're using a Mexican Consulate program. The beginning book teaches participants how to recognize a letter, form a letter, etc. Of the 28 participants, 18 are enrolled in that beginning book, well over half. There are five who do not read or write anything. Ms. Hendrickson said we expected low literacy but did not expect anything like this. Some of the ones who cannot read or write are the most enthusiastic so they recognize they need to have the program. She feels we are meeting a need.

The participants are required to be licensed home care providers to participate.

The educational capacity of a provider is a direct correlation between school readiness and school achievement.

Ms. Hendrickson said one of her concerns is that in the future if the state decides child care providers must be literate to be licensed, then the child care providers may go underground. There are 180 licensed day care providers in our area who could qualify for our program.

We have no computers at this time. Ms. Hendrickson is writing grant proposals. Gates Foundation has asked for a concept paper, which will be submitted next week. We are in a workbook-based curriculum right now but hoping to go to a computer-based curriculum. Information Services Director Kevin Scott is helping Ms. Hendrickson with the list of computer needs and costs. The program needs accessibility to the web-based computer program.

Presently of the 28 providers, they are taking care of an average of 6.3 children so we are having impact on 146 kids. The vast majority of providers are caring for a larger percentage of infants than any other age group (one year and lower). We've tried to put our child care piece aimed at infants. It has been exciting because we've done activities, then had them practice them with the infants and come back and tell us how it went. We've been amazed at the level of interest in the provider, the excitement that they have in being able to see in 2-1/2 weeks an increase in the stuff they're doing with the kids, which to her says we're making an impact.

Ms. Hendrickson listed some other statistics:

48% of the children in the care of these providers do speak some English.

82% of the kids are subsidized by DSHS.

About 90% or higher of the kids that are being cared for are going to either Pasco or Franklin County schools.

Ms. Hendrickson said we hope to open the program up to people besides child care providers in the future.

She said it would be interesting to find out the literacy rate in the total population.

The participants have all asked about getting a GED. They have asked about moving into the CBC childhood development program. They have asked about citizenship. They are excited learners. Three reasons have been given for why the

participants did not attend school themselves as children: 1. too poor. 2. required in their family to work and consequently couldn't go to school. 3. experience in their community was that when they did go to school, the girls came back pregnant and so the parents wouldn't let them socialize in a school setting.

Ms. Hendrickson said this is one of the most enlightening programs we have done. If we succeed, she thinks it will probably be one of the most life-changing things she has ever been involved in. She thanked the Commissioners for being able to host it.

Some volunteers are being used to help with the program. More could be used if they spoke Spanish well.

Ms. Huie-Pascua told the Board about the concept of a Benton-Franklin Counties detox/crisis triage services facility. She gave the Board a handout (Exhibit 9).

Mr. Koch said he thinks a key part of the program is that law enforcement officers have training to recognize behavior that requires treatment.

The long-range plan is to get together staff and services from Detox, crisis response, and the assessment center. Human Services is expecting that a portable building will be placed on the Detox center premises that would allow for office space. Then we could co-locate Crisis Response staff, especially the night person. There are often visiting providers at the Detox center. They are currently trying to put a portable there and have asked for a permit from the City of Pasco. The Detox center work is subcontracted to LaClinica.

Benton and Franklin Counties Detox/Crisis Triage Services

Background:

In mid 2005 the Benton and Franklin County Sub-Acute Detoxification Center was identified as having the capacity to help divert mental health clients who were in crisis from going to the psychiatric inpatient hospital. The Detox Center has capacity for 12 beds—8 male and 4 female. The average monthly utilization of the beds at the facility has been averaging between 55%-65%.

A plan was developed in 2005 to remodel the existing facility to 16 beds. The plans however were placed on hold for a year from late 2005 to the latter part of 2006 due to concern from community stakeholders and the Mental Health Advisory Board of Human Services about the use of the funds allocated to complete the remodel. When the hold was lifted in the fall of 2006, there was a review and discussion with Human Services about movement to an integrated crisis triage capacity for the community by co-locating the programs of the Detox Center and the Crisis Response Unit. The remodel plans were reviewed and determined to be too costly. Discussion continued regarding other ways to rapidly provide an integrated service without having to remodel the facility.

A series of meetings between the Crisis Response Unit and the Detox Center have occurred to discuss the logistics of moving towards an integrated model. It was felt that the most cost effective and short term solution would be to increase the office space capacity for the Crisis Response staff, visiting treatment providers and other allied system personnel. By purchasing a portable unit to place on the premises of the Detox Center the integration of the staff and program could occur with minimum delay.

Many community stakeholders from the Community Health Alliance, advisory boards of substance abuse and mental health with collaboration from the allied provider network have been involved to support this program model which would effectively and efficiently provide needed stabilization services for people in crisis that had a mental illness and/or substance abuse issue. The triage capacity would ultimately provide police officers with the ability to quickly return to patrol after bringing a person to be evaluated to the Detox/Crisis Triage facility.
