Commissioners' Proceeding for June 4, 2007

The Honorable Board of Franklin County Commissioners met on the above date.

Present for the meeting were Bob Koch, Chairman; Neva J. Corkrum, Chair Pro Tem;

and Rick Miller, Member; Fred Bowen, County Administrator; and Mary Withers, Clerk to the Board.

OFFICE BUSINESS

Secretary Patricia Shults met with the Board.

GWMA

Mr. Koch asked the other Board members to read a draft letter from GWMA regarding a request for proposal (RFP) for Federal funding. GWMA has received \$2 million of state funding. The Board gave approval to submit the RFP.

Consent Agenda

Motion - Mr. Miller: I move for approval of the consent agenda as follows:

- 1. Approval of *Out-of-State Travel Request* for Kay Hendrickson to attend Sulky of America Certified Teacher program training, in Portland, Oregon, June 8-10, 2007, for an estimated cost of \$300. (Exhibit 1)
- 2. Approval of *Out-of-State Travel Request* for Lauri Sherfey, Alissa Schneider and Kay Hendrickson to attend a Cultural and Academic Experience in Veracruz, Mexico June 17-26, 2007, for an estimated total cost of \$450. (Exhibit 2)
- 3. Approval of **Resolution 2007-264** authorizing the Chairman of the Board to sign the Assignment of Agreement to Represent Indigent Persons in Franklin County Courts, which hereby assigns and transfers the title and interest and the duties to represent indigent persons in Franklin County courts as required of the agreement by and between Franklin County and Susan D. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 3:0 vote in favor.

TRAC

TRAC Manager Troy Woody talked with the Board by speaker phone.

Mr. Bowen told Mr. Woody that Pasco City Manager Gary Crutchfield asked that the cost for some parking lot improvements be paid for by TRAC at this time.

Mr. Koch said an unimproved parking lot to the south looks so unfinished because of being vacant and weedy. Mr. Woody said he is considering putting basalt rock or something else on the lot to give it a finished look. Mr. Koch said that is his thought also. Mr. Woody asked for direction about costs. Mr. Bowen said that parking lot belongs to the county, not TRAC. He will work on the funding issues with Mr. Woody and others. Vouchers/Warrants

Motion – Mrs. Corkrum: I move approval of vouchers as listed: Current Expense warrants 57288 through 57329 for \$37,765.39; Franklin County RV Facility 349 through 351 for \$2,740.86; Franklin County Public Facilities Construction warrants 799 through 804 for \$25,430.67; Grand Old 4th warrant 137 for \$434.95; Supplemental Preservation Fund warrant 8 for \$123.95; Ending Homelessness Fund warrant 5 for \$7,255.92; Auditor O&M warrant 423 for \$220.68; Courthouse Renovation warrant 536 for \$600.44; Jail Commissary warrants 2338 through 2342 for \$8,258.92; Franklin County Enhanced 911 warrants 1257 through 1258 for \$23,873.07; and Election Equipment warrants 415 through 418 for \$6,343.41; for a total of \$113,048.26. AUDITOR

Auditor Zona Lenhart met with the Board.

Accounting Software

Ms. Lenhart has collected samples of five different RFPs for accounting software and gathered other information. A committee will review the RFPs. The committee includes Ms. Lenhart and Public Works Accountant Dennis Huston as well as Auditor's staff members Tom Westerman and June Xing. Anyone else who wishes to can also be on the committee.

Elections Department design

Ms. Lenhart has received the layout designs for the Elections area. The designs are being printed right now. The Board members can look at them in her office.

Filing Week

Candidates are filing to run for public office this week, the first time it has ever been this early. The Primary will be held August 23. Ballots will go out August 1.

Mr. Bowen told the Board if they choose to put the 3/10ths of 1% tax on the ballot, it would need to be on the November general election ballot rather than the Primary election ballot because it will not be ready by August.

Redistricting

Ms. Lenhart said we're still working on the Commissioner redistricting. She asked for a Board workshop to review the redistricting work.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR

NACo Conference

Bob Koch will be attending a NACo Conference this summer. Rick Miller plans to attend NACo meetings but his appointment to NACo won't be effective until September. Mr. Miller said it is okay with him if Mr. Bowen completes his work with NACo at this time. Then Mr. Miller will begin his NACo work in September.

Out-of-County Travel

Motion – Mr. Miller: I move that we approve out-of-county travel request for Fred Bowen to attend WSAC summer convention at Walla Walla. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 3:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 8)

Health District

The Health District has moved into the Franklin County Annex. The marble on the outside of the building needs to be replaced with stucco. Mr. Bowen asked Facilities Director Christopher Giles to obtain some prices for the work.

Security System

A bid opening is scheduled for June 27 for the Courthouse security system.

MINUTES

<u>Motion</u> - Mrs. Corkrum: I move we approve Commissioners Proceedings for May 30. Second by Mr. Miller. 3:0 vote in favor.

PUBLIC WORKS

Engineer Tim Fife met with the Board.

Vouchers

Motion – Mr. Miller: I move that we approve vouchers for County Road Fund for \$21,094.93 and MV & PW Equipment Fund for \$257,109.93. Second by Mrs. Corkrum. 3:0 vote in favor. (Exhibit 9)

CRP 593 Road 100 Extension / Dent Road - Revised RAP Project Agreement

Mr. Fife said the state is requesting that a revised agreement be signed.

Motion – Mrs. Corkrum: I move that we sign the revised project agreement for CRP 593/ Road 100 Extension/ Dent Road, Project #1106-01. Second by Mr. Miller. 3:0 vote in favor. This is Resolution 2007-267.

Mr. Fife gave the Board a copy of an email from Bruce Reid and Jack McElroy of River Ridge Homeowners Association regarding the Road 100 Extension (Exhibit 10). They would like Phase 5 to be completed at this time rather than waiting until some years in the future. Mr. Fife told the Board again that the engineer's study and report show the additional work is not needed at this time. He said the LaPorte route that is mentioned in the email was considered but it was determined to not be the best route. The preferred alternative is to go straight but it is not needed at this time. We will do it when it is needed.

Road Entry Permits

Mr. Miller asked Mr. Fife to prepare a notice to inform farmers that they can obtain a field entry permit free of charge based on placement of the entryway.

Monthly Reports

Monthly Reports were reviewed.

HUMAN SERVICES (HS)

HS Director Carrie Huie-Pascua met with the Board.

Health District Portable

Ms. Huie-Pascua has talked to LaClinica about moving and using a portable building that the Health District no longer needs.

Developmental Disabilities Services

Sharon Adolphsen is the successful applicant for the Parent Coalition services position. She was already the current coordinator for those services. Parent Coalition services are for parents of children with developmental disabilities, trying to help them be much more self-sufficient. We want our parents to be much more aware of other allied services so they are not just dependent upon the one service.

We are rapidly trying to put together all of the Developmental Disabilities contracts that are in place for the upcoming biennium.

Mental Health Services

They are the final two components that Clegg and Associates has been contracted to do with us. The Case Management Workshop is looking at how do we do better with the array of services that fall under case management. Services include life skills and independent living services. We are trying to provide the services where the client is, not expecting people to come to our offices. It can be in their home, the library, in a car. We are determining how they can become much more self-sufficient to recover better. It's a shift away from facility-based services to community-based services. The broader term is

community support. We are trying to get our providers to truly understand what community support is.

Housing Workgroup: Housing is always a main issue for everyone. If someone's mental illness is pretty severe, they are likely to deteriorate if they do not have adequate housing. We are looking at now and in the future.

Ms. Huie-Pascua participates in the Continuum of Care through the Community Action Committee (CAC). Human Services is in the process of hiring a housing program specialist. Human Services plans to develop a housing component to better serve the clients. We need to be accessing the housing dollars to fund the housing needs. She expects the specialist to be writing grants and bringing more dollars into the community.

Tomorrow there will be a bi-county meeting for Clegg and Associates to report on their strategic review of all Human Services. The Human Services staff will receive a similar presentation on June 5. Dawn Smart is the lead on the review process. Judy Clegg is the owner of Clegg and Associates. Ms. Huie-Pascua also will participate.

Greater Columbia Behavioral Health (GCBH) or Regional Support Network (RSN): The RSN is going to transfer the responsibility to Human Services for the Jail Services contract amendment. The effective date will be a three-month amendment until the regular contracting cycle starts.

Project for Assistance in Transition for Homeless (PATH) contract with Lourdes Counseling Center: The grant is \$42,250 with a match portion of \$15,465 for a total of \$57,715. Last year Human Services paid for the match portion. In other PATH grants like this such as in Yakima County, the agency supplies the match portion. Ms. Huie-Pascua does not know why Human Services provided the match portion last year. It isn't a lot of money and it is a very important project. Lourdes should be paying the match portion. We will be working with Lourdes to have them provide the match.

The Mental Health Contract Amendments are being processed. They are referred to as a bridge contract. We are also going through a request for proposals for mental health services. We are looking for qualified providers who understand the priorities and

the changes Human Services is going through. Our present contractors are Lourdes, Sunderland, Nueva and Lutheran.

Mrs. Corkrum asked if the Sunderland concerns have been resolved. Ms. Huie-Pascua said they are still being worked on with one concern resolved. One residential house will be made into a crisis stabilization area. We will then have eight slots, doubling the capacity for crisis stabilization. There are two houses in Richland. The other house has a different kind of spending plan that is smarter than in the past. We were using a reserve fund for both of those houses, which was drawing down very rapidly. There are Federal Title 19 funds that could have been used for a portion of the treatment services for people who had a medical coupon. A realignment has taken place. We have renegotiated a funding support plan that will be better for the provider agency that runs the program (currently Sunderland) and also better for Human Services. Substance Abuse and Prevention Services (chemical dependency)

We are finalizing all of the contract monitoring. Out of the bid process, we do have one current provider that we do not plan to continue contracting with in the coming biennium.

The Six-Year Strategic Plan was submitted on June 1. It is a massive plan that is updated every two years. The program specialist who prepared it did a very good job. It is submitted to the state Division of Alcohol and Substance Abuse (DASA).

Substance Abuse Assessment Center Services: We are still working with the center to make the transition as effective as possible. We are going to make sure we're staffed adequately so there isn't a backlog.

Human Services is in the final few weeks of completing the annual contract monitoring process for substance abuse providers. In the future, Ms. Huie-Pascua expects there to be ongoing assistance for the contractors instead of all occurring at the last minute. We will be providing the providers with information about any changes and with technical assistance throughout the year.

HORTICULTURAL AND PEST CONTROL BOARD

Director Tom Wilson and Al Morrongiello met with the Board. Mr. Morrongiello does cherry leaf roll inspections as part of his job.

Cherry Leaf Roll Virus (CLRV)

Mr. Wilson gave the Board a list of current work on CLRV for the year. It cost \$1000 last year for the CLRV tests. Mr. Wilson told the Board that Mr. Morrongiello does good work and is very accurate in knowing what CLRV looks like before sending samples to be tested.

The Board said Tim Waters, WSU Extension Agent, may be able to provide help to the Pest Control staff.

Tree Buy-Back Activity

Mr. Wilson gave the Board a chart showing the tree buy-back activity for 2007 so far. He told them about one 80-acre orchard that has been removed. The Pest Board helped the contractors receive approval for expediting burn permits through the Department of Ecology in Spokane because the orchard was certified to have fire blight. WSU chart

Mike Bush of WSU prepared a chart titled "Why Growing Fruit Trees in the Backyard May Not Be for Everyone." Mr. Bush has agreed to allow Franklin County Pest Board to used the chart and make a few changes so it applies to Franklin County. The chart will then be printed and inserted as a flyer in the newspaper for educational purposes.

Concerns about flowering trees in Pasco

Mr. Wilson told the Board that many of the new housing developments now have flowering pear trees planted in them. In addition, there are many flowering trees planted on city right-of-ways such as Burden Boulevard. He said one variety is called Bradford, an old variety of flowering pear that most people stopped using because they have a history of the root splitting. He is finding coddling moth in the traps near the trees. It is not in the fruit yet. If we find coddling moth in the fruits, the trees will have to go. The city can spray them. There would be an expense for spray and labor. We raised our tree buyback program from \$40 to \$50. The city probably would get the trees for less than

\$50 per tree so we could pay maybe 30%. That would only happen if we find the moths in the fruit.

Tree Buy-Back Coupons

Mr. Wilson told the Board about a request to provide tree buy-back coupons to people in Benton County because of the potential that pests could be carried by the wind to Franklin County. The Board does not think the county's funds can be used in Benton County for that purpose. Mr. Wilson will check with Chief Civil Deputy Prosecutor Ryan Verhulp.

Mr. Wilson said it is possible future coupons will be printed with the words "only redeemable in Franklin County."



Subject: Comments on Road 100 Extension Public Hearing

Dear Bryant:

Thank you for meeting with us on May 29 to discuss our concerns about the Road 100 extension. Had we not had this meeting, we would not have found out about the Public Hearing that took place yesterday, May 30, 2007 at the Franklin County Court House. As you know, neither of us could make this meeting but on short notice we were able to have two of our homeowners present for the hearing.

We continue to be perplexed by what is planned. While we fully support the intent of this effort and encourage proceeding with Phases 1, 2 and 3 on a priority basis, we think that the money being invested in Phase 4 could be better spent and provide a permanent rather than a partial solution which will require fixing at some point in the future.

Franklin County does not have a very good record for engineering roads right the first time. The Road 100 interchange at I-182 will be undergoing a major upgrade, and the Road 68 interchange with I-182 has already been modified twice and still needs fixing (a free right turn off of Road 68 westbound onto I-182 is an absolute must in order to solve the backup problems that exist there on a daily basis). So it would be nice if this Road 100 extension were done correctly from the beginning.

I am attaching a recent satellite photo that shows the area between Dent and Columbia River Rd, including detail associated with the extension of Easy St/Road 100 in a direct route until it intercepts Columbia River Rd. There is only one parcel (potato field) that requires dissecting and the road would go down the middle with farmable land on both sides. The rest of the parcels are already arranged so that a road extension would go along the edges of farm fields. (Admittedly some amount of redoing of rill type irrigation ditches would need to be done.) So we are perplexed when you tell us, and then it is repeated at the hearing, that it is too complex to mess with this irrigated area. Irrigation circles were also mentioned. As you can clearly see, there are no circles in this area. We confirmed all of this by doing a drive and walk around of this area today.

If going straight ahead is too much of a problem, then take a hard look at putting in two S-curves and doing a jog over to La Porte Dr. The only thing affected is the corner of two potato fields. In addition, La Porte is already paved for about half of its length, so this is a natural and readily available permanent solution.

We continue to think that it is a poor use of our taxes to put a lot of money into a 135 degree curve at Columbia River Rd as is planned in Phase 4. Trucks will have great difficulty with this. More importantly, if the State is indeed paying for a substantial portion of this project and a prime reason is **Emergency Response** then there is every reason to avoid construction of an emergency response route with a backwards zig-zag. (By the way, John Scheer, Director of

Franklin County Emergency response was not aware of this project when I called him today) The same logic applies to both fire and nuclear response-there is no difference, time is of the essence! To treat this as only a matter of 45 seconds difference is really putting a small value on the lives and property of all of us that are affected.

Now that we are aware that the State is funding much of this, we plan to forward these concerns to our three state representatives.

We request that we be added to the mailing list for these Public Hearing announcements.
