Commissioners' Proceedings for May 30, 2012

This document is a summarized version of the Board of Commissioners proceedings. The minutes are paraphrased, not verbatim. Access to an electronic audio recording of the meeting is available upon request.

The Honorable Board of Franklin County Commissioners met on the above date. Present for the meeting were Brad Peck, Chairman; Rick Miller, Chair Pro Tem; and Robert E. Koch, Member; Fred Bowen, County Administrator; and Mary Withers, Clerk to the Board. Meeting convened at 9:00 am.

TRAC

TRAC Manager Troy Woody and Alysa Wiyrick, Energy Engineer from the Washington State Department of Enterprise Services, met with the Board. Present in audience: Rich Lahtinen, Al Yenney, Jim Follansbee, Lester Storms, Roger Lenk, Patrick Barnett and <u>Tri-City Herald</u> Reporter John Trumbo.

Energy Savings Company (ESCO) and Energy Conservation Project Management Services discussion

Mr. Woody explained the process of conducting an energy audit at a cost of \$15,000 which would be deducted if Franklin County accepts the audit and proceeds further. The scope of the proposed project would be for the TRAC Pavilion, TRAC Expo Hall and the Public Safety Building. Mr. Woody and Ms. Wiyrick answered the Board's questions.

Mr. Koch said he can support it. Mr. Miller expressed approval to proceed.

Mr. Peck said the idea is that the county would pay a loan back over time with the energy savings.

Mr. Peck said he is not opposed to it. He does have a reservation in terms of the future of TRAC and explained that typically in transitioning to other owners, you don't enter into long-term agreements. He noted it may be seen as an added value as opposed to an encumbrance.

Mr. Peck said you've got your support from the Board to move to the next step. Just keep us posted.



Re: Issuance of Limited Tax General Obligation Bonds

Honorable Commissioners:

It is a pleasure to continue working with Franklin County as its bond counsel. As set forth in previous engagement letters, the ethics rules governing lawyers require that I provide the County with a written agreement pertaining to our proposed bond counsel service because our fee is contingent upon the issuance of the bonds. Further, RCW 36.27.040 requires that the Prosecuting Attorney appoint me as a special deputy prosecuting attorney for the limited purpose of providing the legal services described below. This has occurred on previous financings, but I think it is best to renew that appointment.

We understand that the County desires to issue limited tax general obligation bonds (the "Bonds") to pay costs of (i) acquiring, constructing, installing and equipping improvements to the County's courthouse, criminal justice facilities and jail facilities; and (ii) acquiring computer software. We further understand that the Bonds will be purchased by Martin Nelson & Company, Inc. The purpose of this engagement letter is to set forth certain matters concerning the services Foster Pepper PLLC will perform as bond counsel to the County in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

SCOPE OF ENGAGEMENT

In this engagement, we expect to perform the following duties: (i) subject to the completion of proceedings to our satisfaction, render our legal opinion (the "Opinion") regarding the validity and binding effect of the Bonds, the source of payment and security for the Bonds, and the excludability of interest on the Bonds from gross income for federal income tax purposes; (ii) prepare and review documents necessary or appropriate to the authorization, issuance and delivery of the Bonds, and coordinate the authorization and execution of such documents; (iii) review legal issues relating to the structure of the Bond issue; and (iv) review the section of the official statement, private placement memorandum or other form of offering or disclosure document to be disseminated in connection with the sale of the Bonds involving the federal income tax treatment of interest on the Bonds.

The Opinion will be addressed to the County and will be delivered by us on the date the Bonds are exchanged for their purchase price (the "Closing"). The Opinion will be based on facts and law existing as of its date. In rendering the Opinion, we will rely upon the certified proceedings and other certifications of public officials and other persons furnished to us without undertaking to verify the same by independent investigation, and we will assume continuing compliance by the County after the Bonds are issued with applicable laws relating to the Bonds. During the course of this engagement, we will rely on the County to provide us with complete and timely information on all developments pertaining to any aspect of the Bonds and their security. We understand that officials and employees of the County will cooperate with us in this regard.

ATTORNEY-CLIENT RELATIONSHIP

Upon execution of this engagement letter, the County will be our client and an attorney-client relationship will exist between us. In this transaction we represent only the County, we are not counsel to any other party, and we are not acting as an intermediary among the parties. Our services as bond counsel regarding the Bonds are limited to those contracted for in this letter. The County's execution of this engagement letter will constitute an acknowledgment of those limitations. Our representation of the County regarding the Bonds will be concluded upon issuance of the Bonds. Nevertheless, subsequent to the Closing, we will mail the appropriate Internal Revenue Service Form 8038, and prepare and distribute to the participants in the transaction a transcript of the proceedings pertaining to the Bonds.

CONFLICTS

As you are aware, our firm represents many political subdivisions, companies and individuals. It is possible that during the time that we are representing the County, one or more of our present or future clients will have transactions with the County. It is also possible (but unlikely) that we may be asked to represent, in an unrelated matter, one or more of the entities involved in the issuance of the Bonds. We do not foresee that any such representation, if it occurs, will adversely affect our ability to represent the County as provided in this letter, either because such matters will be sufficiently different from the issuance of the Bonds so as to make such representations not adverse to our representation of the County, or because the potential for such adversity is remote or minor and outweighed by the consideration that it is unlikely that advice given to the other client will be relevant to any aspect of the issuance of the Bonds. Execution of this letter will signify the County's consent to our representation of others consistent with the circumstances described in this paragraph.

FEES

Based upon: (i) our current understanding of the terms, structure, size and schedule of the financings represented by the Bonds; (ii) the duties we will undertake pursuant to this engagement letter; and (iii) the responsibilities we will assume in connection therewith, our fee, including out-of-pocket costs, will be \$39,300, including out-of-pocket costs. Our fee may vary if: (a) the aggregate principal amount of Bonds issued are significantly greater or less than the current estimate of \$20,345,000; (b) material changes in the structure or schedule of the financings occur; or (c) if unusual or unforeseen circumstances arise that require a significant increase in our time or responsibility. If, at any time, we believe that circumstances require an

adjustment of our original fee estimate, we will advise you. Our fee will be paid (via wire transfer) at Closing from Bond proceeds by the Purchaser. The Board of Commissioners consents to payment of our fee in this manner.

RECORDS

Upon request, papers and property furnished by you will be returned promptly. Our own files, including lawyer work product, pertaining to the transaction will be retained by us. For various reasons, including the minimization of unnecessary storage expenses, we reserve the right to dispose of any documents or other materials retained by us after the termination of this engagement.

If the foregoing terms are acceptable to the County, please cause two copies of this letter to be executed by the appropriate County officials. One copy should be returned to me and the other should be retained in the County's files. We look forward to working with you again.
