CALL TO ORDER

Commission Chairman Rick Miller called the Franklin County Commissioners' Regular Board Meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., in the Commissioners' Meeting Room in the Franklin County Courthouse located at 1016 North Fourth Avenue, Pasco, Washington.

Commissioners Present: Commission Chair Rick Miller, Chair Pro Tem Robert E. Koch and Member Brad Peck

Staff Present: County Administrator Keith Johnson, Auditor Matt Beaton, Human Resources Director Carlee Nave, Coroner Dan Blasdel and Clerk to the Board Karin Milham

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Miller led the Pledge of Allegiance

RECLASSIFICATION OF CHIEF DEPUTY CORONER

Human Resources Director Carlee Nave presented the Board with the Fair Labor Standard Act that would effect a few positions in the County as of January 1, 2017. Chief Deputy Coroner is one of the positions that would need a change.

After brief discussion, Resolution 2016-424 reclassifying the Chief Deputy Coroner position was tabled until Ms. Nave could gather additional information to bring back to the board for discussion at a later date.

PUBLIC COMMENT

- Mr. Clint Didier expressed concern regarding discussion of salaries for the Coroner's office in light of proposed salary increases for Commissioners. He stated he was appalled by the proposed increase adding he didn't feel the work week and/or duties of a Commissioner warranted a \$94,350 annual salary. He urged the Commissioners to approve a reasonable salary for all three Commissioner positions.
- Mr. Rodney Mullen also expressed concern regarding the proposed salary increase for Commissioners. He felt the timing of the proposed increase was strategically planned and orchestrated, dishonest and purely political.

- Mr. Steve Allen noted raises for Commissioners have historically been discussed earlier
 in the year and felt the timing created a feeling of distrust and secrecy. He stated the
 County is going through turmoil right now and it was because of secrecy and dishonesty.
 He hoped Commissioners could give some confidence back to the County taxpayers.
- Mr. Joel Prantle also felt the timing was strange and felt it gave the impression of dishonesty and distrust. He felt he could do the same job for half the salary and still get the job done.

Commissioner Peck responded to the comments stating he had previously made a motion to reduce the Commissioners' salaries to \$1.00 per year. Once it was pointed out that the state required Commissioners be paid a minimum amount of approximately \$14,000 annually, he was in favor of reducing Commissioners salaries to the minimum amount. He didn't think any other Franklin County Commissioner had ever made such a motion to reduce the annual salary to the minimum required by law. The motion was not seconded and died on the table.

Commissioner Peck addressed Mr. Didier's concerns about the salaries in the Coroner's office stating the position had been described as a part-time position where one coroner works for one week, then the other works for one week, then the third coroner works for one week and they rotate. To compare a position that works one week out of three to a Commissioners position is unrealistic. He explained the scope of responsibilities of a Commissioner is much deeper than most people realize. Each Commissioner represents Franklin County on approximately twenty different boards and commissions and travels to represent the County at meetings all over the Country. It is much more than sitting in the Franklin County Commissioners' Meeting room for a weekly County Commissioners' meeting.

Commissioner Peck also explained the historical practice of proposing an increase to the Commissioners' salaries prior to the filing period is something he has supported. He stated this year was different in that there was pressure to increase salaries for employees. The Commission asked staff to research salaries of comparable sized counties to determine if Franklin County was losing employees due to lower wages. He acknowledged Franklin County had recently lost senior, highly skilled employees to other counties due to wages and felt that was an indicator Franklin County was not paying enough to attract and keep highly skilled applicants. As a result of the study, a salary package was presented increasing salaries for all elected officials, not just Commissioners, as well as all employees. He further explained that once a salary for Commissioners is set, it cannot be changed during that Commissioner's four-year term. In this case, the proposed five percent increase for years 2017-2020 works out to 1.2 percent per year over a four-year period but due to the law, it begins January 1, 2017. For other elected officials and employees, there was a retroactive increase of two percent (2%) in September 2016, another will be added as of January 2017 and another two percent (2%) in January 2018 for a total of six percent over the course of fourteen months.

With respect to whether the Commissioner positions are paid more than they're worth, Commissioner Peck stated he came from a career that compensated at a much higher level but chose to run for County Commissioner because he feels this is an important job and strives to do it well.

The suggestion that discussing the salary increase on Election Day is somehow inappropriate or underhanded ignores the fact that there was no intent to increase pay until late summer when the county started losing employees and the fact research regarding the comparable county salaries revealed Franklin County salaries were, indeed, lower.

He also addressed the fact that, due to election terms, the Franklin County Commissioner representing District Three was doing the same job for a higher salary than the Commissioners representing Districts One and Two. This increase would bring all three positions to the same annual salary.

Commissioner Miller explained during the previous election cycles, the salary for his position was lower than the other two districts and reiterated the intent of the proposed increase was bring all three positions to the same annual salary.

Mr. Allen still felt the fact Commissioners' salaries were not discussed earlier in the year but on Election Day gives the perception of dishonesty and secrecy, regardless of what other employees and/or elected officials receive.

Mr. Didier felt, if the Commissioners were truly worried about losing employees to other counties due to salary issues, they should forego an increase and give money to the employee.

There was extensive discussion of what it means to be a County Commissioner and/or public servant, whether Franklin County Commissioners' salaries should be raised or lowered to the minimum annual salary and employee health care savings accounts versus deferred compensation.

Commissioner Miller closed Public Comment.
