9:00 AM Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance

Commission Chairman Brad Peck called the Franklin County Commissioners' Regular Board Meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., in the Commissioners' Meeting Room in the Franklin County Courthouse located at 1016 North Fourth Avenue, Pasco, Washington.

The April 10, 2018 Commissioners' Meeting Minutes were approved.

9:03 AM Consider Approval for an Exception to the Minimum Lot Size Short Plat 2017-04 Harder Farms Inc.

Acting Planning Director Nicole Stickney presented the Board with a request to approve a minimum lot size Short Plat. Short Plat 2017-04 is an application by Lynn Harmon of Washington State Parks and Recreation for the approval of a two lot Short Plat. The owner is Harder Farms, Inc. The proposal is to divide approx. 640 acres into two new lots. Proposed New Lot #1 is approximately 12 acres in size and would not be used for residential use; it would be used for a Washington State Parks parking lot, proposed Lot #2 would be approx. 628 acres in size. The property is zoned Agricultural Production 40 (AP-40). The proposed Short Plat is located on Palouse Falls Road. There is no assigned address. (Parcel 100-450-013)

• The Franklin County Superior Court Judges have appointed Dale Kamerrer as a legal representative on their behalf. Mr. Kamerrer spoke via phone conference call to the Commissioners pertaining to the Judges local court rule and order to the County Clerk regarding documentation matter and the process of operation.



In order to authorize funds to pursue litigation on the matter, Mr. Kamerrer presented the Judges' point of view on to the Board.

Franklin County Prosecuting Attorney Shawn Sant informed the Board that the State Attorney General had declined to take this case as they felt it was not proper for them to take a role in this matter. Mr. Sant expressed his opinion by stating mediation might be a possible solution for both parties to resolve this disagreement. He felt that either party would not be satisfied with a lower court's ruling and could see this escalating to the Supreme Court which could require a substantial financial commitment.

The Board decided to defer the funding for a period of time to give both parties an opportunity to investigate other remedies for settling the issue, possibly something that would be more cost effective.

10:17AM Public Comment was given as follows:

- Resident Brenda High representing herself and Lawanda Hatch who had to leave early; both are opposed to redistricting Commissioner Districts prior to the election.
- Resident Clint Didier expressed his strong opposition of redistricting prior to the election. He also asked the public to request the audio of the Commissioner Meetings. Mr. Didier expressed his concerns on how the Commissioners' Meeting Minutes were written. Mr. Didier stated, "It looks as if there is some maneuvering here to keep the public uninformed. I strongly suggest you do not do that either or there will be a wrath from this north county of farmers that want to be represented here on the Commissioners".
- Auditor Matt Beaton expressed concerns about discussion in a previous meeting regarding redistricting prior to elections when it was not on the agenda. Mr. Beaton asked the Board to be open and transparent as to the topic of redistricting as public would like to be included in the process.
- Resident Taylor Toranto asked the Board to postpone redistricting until the election was over.

Commissioner Peck gave a brief summary of comments he made in a previous meeting. He read verbatim from Washington state statutes and the requirements for Commissioner Districts. The new bill 6002 signed by the Governor (known as the Voting Rights Act) promotes equal voting opportunity in certain political subdivisions and establishes a cause of action to redress the lack of voter opportunity. Opening this conversation with the Board did not necessitate action prior to the election. Commissioner Peck suggested people read state statues and the voting rights act to become familiar with the process of redistricting. He said he created a notional draft map that was produced for working purposes only in an effort to balance district populations and meet requirements of the new voting rights act set to take effect in July. The working map would be nothing more than a starting point for Board discussion on possible redistricting.
